2018 was a study in contrasts.

The extreme wet weather was very hard on the trail and the trail maintenance volunteers over the last year. We really got slammed in July and then again in September with multiple landslides, slips and maybe 150-200 trees down on or across the trail. Thanks to a rapid response from a local contractor and available volunteers, most trail closures were measured in hours and only one was more than 24 hours due to the volume of mud and debris on the trail. The Visitors' Center was struck by slide debris in July but thanks to Marei Burnfield and her team, was open for business over the busy 4th holiday week temporarily operating from a canopy.

On the brighter side our hard working volunteers totaled over 3500 hours of service with much of it focused on storm damage remediation this year. The 1/2 Marathon/5K and the Yough 'n Roll ride and walk were both very successful thanks to hard work by those committees led by Kathie Fawcett and Kathy Banfield respectively. Membership advanced to a record 505 this year and that financial support is vital to our mission of providing the best trail possible for all trail users; bike riders, walkers, dog walkers, stroller pushers and those who just enjoy sitting on a bench and enjoying the view. Our new Ford F550 dump truck has been a huge help and time saver. We put over 1000 miles on it between June and March of this year almost all on the trail. Our new web site is up and running and loads very fast whether you are on your phone, tablet or home computer. We are committed to faster updates and are now posting minutes from our monthly meeting after they have been accepted the following month.

I would like to especially recognize one of our corporate partners, PA American Water and the American Water Foundation. Not only do they support our trail events with their custom made hydration station/water bottle filling truck, they also have provided annual financial support in recognition of employee Marei Burnfield' s many volunteer hours.



In addition, the local PA American Water Maintenance Center in Elizabeth participates in maintaining the trail through an annual day of service. This is huge as these highly trained volunteers also bring some of their equipment. In one day, with support from MYTC volunteers and equipment we have been able to complete

projects that would take our crew several weekends.

Thanks to trail volunteer John Warhold, we are working with 15 year old Eagle Scout candidate AJ Marflak from White Oak on his Eagle Scout community service project.

AJ and Scout troop 284 really enjoy camping at our Queen Aliquippa campground along the trail near Buena Vista and wanted to give back to the trail. The campground was originally built with extensive assistance from two local Scout troops many years ago.

With support from his family and troop leaders AJ has accepted the challenge of renovating and upgrading the storage container located at the campground. This 40' long former shipping container is vital to our mowing and maintaining the campground area, toilets and the drinking water well.

The work will include treating rusted areas, pressure washing the inside, installation of additional shelving, painting the outside, installation of skylights and vents, repair of the mower ramp and last, but not least some low maintenance landscaping.

MYTC will be supporting this much needed and appreciated project with paint, roof sealer, wood chips and various equipment and supplies. If you want to help support this costly project there will be a donation jar at the Visitors Center in Boston as soon as it opens for the season. If you want to lend a hand let us know and we will put you in touch with AJ.

Tastee Freez / Yough Twister

Anyone traveling the MYTC section of the Great Allegheny Passage (GAP) is sure to know about ice cream and yogurt at the "Yough Twister" in Blythedale at the Sutersville Bridge near GAP MP 117. Long time locals however, still remember it as the "Tastee Freez".

The Tastee Freez saga started in 1950, when Leo Moranz invented a soft serve pump that competed with the existing Dairy Queen process. In its prime in 1957,



Tastee Freez had over 1800 locations, most of them franchises all across the USA, many in the Tri-State area. However, for various reasons, Tastee Freez could not compete,

lost franchises and currently has only 23 stores nationwide, with the closest in Paden City, WV. Dairy Queen, however, has over 6400 nationwide locations.

According to local residents and cousins Beverly Capranica and Pat Petrovich, their uncle and father Deano Soncini and business partner Richard Saccani (original owners of the Valley Motor Services & Gas Station across the street) bought the empty lot in 1955 with the purpose of building the Tastee Freez.

The 1st owner of the business was Beverly's cousin Albert Catani who rented the building from Deano and Richard. The lot/business was sold in 1972 to Patricia and Ray Driscoll who ran the operation for years.



It is currently owned by their son and wife, Cynthia and Ray Driscoll, with their 3 sons as operators. According to Ray Driscoll, they dropped

Yough Twister – Blythedale ~2018 the Tastee Freez franchise and changed the name to Yough Twister in ~2004. Also according to Ray, business increased with completion of the GAP and, in 2013, they opened the Driscoll Restaurant, located behind the Yough Twister. Both of these businesses remain favorites with locals and Great Allegheny Passage riders and walkers.

Clean-up Projects Prepare Trail for 2019

As this issue goes to press MYTC's Trail Maintenance crew is busy preparing the trail for the 2019 season. A landslide near Dead Man's Hollow in 2018 did not block



the trail but brought down much debris and many trees. MYTC volunteers cleaned up the trees to allow passage through this section, but the slide debris was more than volunteers could handle

so a contract was recently awarded to Karl Blaha Excavating & Trucking to clear the mess. This clean-up was completed in early March.

Also between GAP Mile 128 and 129 near Deadman's



Hollow, a 150-ft section along the paved trail collapsed in the aftermath of flooding rains during September 2018. Over the winter, MYTC's Trail Maintenance crew developed a work plan to

address this problem and awarded a contract to MSB Excavating to begin initial repairs. MYTC volunteers removed trees in the work area to allow contractor access. The first phase of these repairs will be completed by April. Thanks to Generation Stone Works in Boston for donation of the fill material. Funding for contractor work is being provided through the Regional Trail Corporation and the Allegheny Trail Alliance.

Many volunteers helped deal with these problems in addition to doing all the normal maintenance such as mowing grass along the trail, at the campground and at trail parking lots, clearing fallen trees blocking the trail, and cleaning out drainage ditches, along with keeping all the equipment in working order at MYTC's shop. Volunteers work on Saturday mornings throughout the year, and also on weekdays, to complete these tasks.
